It is an honor to serve as the executive director of the legal aid program in Seminole county and a privilege to work with so many inspiring board members, volunteer attorneys and college students and dedicated staff.

Together with many essential partners from the private bar, charitable foundations, The Galloway Foundation and Ryan Foundation, and local governments, we have made great progress towards the goal to increase the availability of meaningful access to justice for vulnerable individuals and families and thereby improve their outcomes and quality of life. We have produced remarkable results that we are proud to present in this Report.

In particular this year, we have commenced our free monthly legal advice clinic for our American Heroes , our Veterans, in partnership with Seminole County Public Library. We started a special education legal advocacy project (The Endless Dream Project) to assist disabled foster care children secure a high school diploma. And we have assisted in updating of the guardian advocate guide and self-help pleadings used by parents of disabled children to learn the important process of securing a guardianship to protect their children.

We build a new website to provide more information and resources to the community and started a new social media campaign to unify our volunteer efforts. We work diligently to serve the poor, the disabled, elderly, children and the physically abused secure access to the justice system and strengthen our community.

I extend special thanks for our remarkable board of directors led by our dedicated president, Attorney Steven Kramer. They have shared their special gifts of time and expertise to truly enhance the quality and reach of our program. Their dedication and impact truly advances our mission. Mission and Achievements

The Seminole County Bar Association Legal Aid Society had its humble beginnings in 1975. The goal of SCBALAS has remained steadfast for 41 years: To provide free, quality legal advocacy to economically disadvantaged residents of Seminole County and improve their quality of life while enhancing their self-sufficiency and improving our neighborhoods. We are proud to continue this mission as we head into our 42nd year of service to the community.


Seminole county residents with incomes at or below 125% of the Federal Poverty Level are financially eligible for our legal services. Priority is given to financially eligible residents who have an urgent legal problem. This can include but is not limited to, safeguarding victims of domestic violence and their families, helping someone keep their home and prevent foreclosure, and other matters in family law which could put the family in financial peril.

These services are provided through the unified efforts of pro bono attorneys who give generously of their time, experienced staff attorneys, devoted and compassionate support staff, volunteer law and college students and laypersons, and strong leadership of a dedicated board of directors. As a result of this collaboration, we are able to provide legal assistance in various areas of the law such as family, housing, employment, bankruptcy, guardianship of the disabled and incapacitated, immigration, juvenile, elder, foreclosure and consumer.

Our program is funded by the contributions of our volunteer attorneys, Seminole County, Heart of Florida United Way, the Florida Bar Foundation, Ryan Foundation, Harper Family Charitable Foundation, Galloway Foundation, City of Altamonte Springs, and State Grants.

This past fiscal year, our volunteer and staff attorneys served 935 families, which included 1,306 children with their legal needs. We obtained \$187,098.36 in child support and alimony to sustain needy families. Volunteer attorneys donated pro bono legal services valued at an estimated \$98,000 and contributed \$28,280 in lieu of service donations.

We have developed a number of special projects to serve the individual needs of the economically disadvantaged. We are proud of these new projects and our continued efforts to expand the Legal Aid Society's reach into the community, and we invite you to review them on the following pages.



Our Stories

Strengthening foster youths in school.....

Thomas has been in foster care for almost his entire life. He has bounced from one foster care home to the next. Despite these many obstacles, Thomas made sure to attend school, obtain the necessary grade point average and credits needed to finish high school. However, Thomas has not been able to pass his required standardized test despite taking it twice each year while in high school. The school staff told him he was ready to graduate and would be awarded a “certificate of completion”. Thomas quickly found out that a certificate of completion did not open any further doors in his life but only shut doors to his future. Thomas sought help from legal aid in Seminole County. He said, “I want to enroll in college to pursue a film degree but the college will not accept me. I do not have a diploma and can not pass the GED.” He quickly received help and contact was made with the legal department of his high school for him to be tested for any and all suspected disabilities so that the required standardized exam could be waived or accommodations would be permitted so Thomas can get his diploma. The school is in the process of completing the evaluation and hopefully open doors to a bright and successful future.


Endless Dreams project started in 2016 in collaboration with the legal aid program in Orange County and Community Based Care First Star Academy. The goal is for foster youths to realize their endless dreams by achieving academic success in High School for a bright and prosperous future. Most foster youth do not graduate and face many hardships in employment opportunities.



Helping families seek protection from abuse.....

Carla, a mother of a son, worked two jobs to support her family while her husband was out of work. When she came home, she would find her husband drinking and in an irritable mood. The neighbors called the police twice during the past week for the loud yelling and noise coming from their home. The previous night her husband began throwing items and hitting her in front of her son. He had hit her before but never before their son. Her son's school called her and reported that her son appeared upset in class. Carla picked up her son and went to the domestic violence shelter which referred her to our program for legal help. The assigned attorney walked her through the legal process. She was granted a Final Judgment of Injunction for Protection which included provisions to protect their son and followed by securing a dissolution of marriage. Carla and her son have a new beginning free of violence.

In 2016, Seminole County Legal Aid assisted 110 adult victims, including 173 children, with advice and representation in domestic violence injunctions. This aggressive representation has provided the community with countless benefits. Those benefits include stability to families and individuals seeking protection in violent relationships, protection to children from ongoing and future abuse and breaking the cycle of violence in our community. In addition to these services, we also helped many individuals and families in other family matters including divorce, paternity and child support. In fiscal year 2015-2016, our office was able to get court ordered child support totaling over \$187,000.




Lawyers help clear barriers for seriously ill children.....

Katie was born to young parents who often used illicit drugs and could not control their habit. One day while her parents were both under the influence of drugs, beautiful precocious Katie fell into the family's swimming pool. Katie was rescued but was left with serious medical issues and irreversible brain damage. Katie requires extensive round the clock medical care to thrive. Katie lingered in a medical foster care home until a distant relative desired to adopt Katie if she was able to secure public benefits from the Agency from Persons with Disability. The relative contacted legal aid for help. Quickly a staff attorney was assigned to the case and gathered sufficient documentation to apply for the benefits. Katie now lives under the care of the relative with the necessary benefit needed to manage her care. This is one example of a child help in this special project. This past year, we have assisted 9 seriously ill or disabled children apply for needed benefits.

Helping parents gain rights to keep making decisions.....



Patrice is a divorced mother of twin boys who are autistic. She has cared for them and made sacrifices in her life to make sure that her sons received the best care to address their special needs. She is employed as a house keeper so that her schedule is flexible in case of any emergency. When her sons turned 18 years of age, she was told that she would need to be appointed guardian of the children to continue to make medical, education and other social decisions for her sons. She could not afford a private attorney to help her and was in despair when one of her employers suggested calling legal aid in Seminole County. At legal aid she found free legal help. All her legal needs were immediately addressed and she was appointed guardian of her twin boys. She was also directed to other social programs that could help her with her sons.



The only way parents can continue making decisions for their disabled child is to become their legal guardian. Seminole County Legal Aid was able to render legal assistance to 133 families concerning guardianship for their disabled children. We also helped develop a comprehensive guide with the necessary pro se forms to assist local families to apply for guardian advocacy. This guide can be found on the Eighteenth Judicial Circuit Court website.



Legal Aid helps create stable housing.....

Susan has lived in Seminole County all her life. She lives in one of two modest homes left to her by her deceased father. Both properties were left to her free and clear of any mortgages. Susan maintained the properties and paid their respective property taxes each year. One property provided her with a rental income to assist her in caring for her elderly mother. Susan came to our office last year after receiving a foreclosure notice on this rental property. The staff attorney assigned to her case worked to determine how a mortgage was obtained and recorded against the property. It was determined that some 17 years after her father's death the property had been fraudulently conveyed to another individual and documents revealed this individual took out a mortgage against the property. Our staff attorney worked diligently and Susan obtained a dismissal of the foreclosure action. This allowed her to keep the house left to her by her father and continued to provide a rental income which would allow her to continue to take care of her elderly mother.

In 2016, Seminole County Legal Aid was able to render legal assistance to 191 families concerning housing issues.

Legal aid is an essential tool that paves the way for many Americans to find a safe and decent place to call home.


Volunteer Attorneys making a Difference.....



Every Week Volunteer Attorneys visit our office to participate in our free Family Law Advice Clinic. At the clinic, the client receives information about their legal rights, how to complete self help forms and receive important advice concerning their specific legal problem. Last fiscal year our pro bono attorneys assisted 56 clients in this special clinic. An additional 27 clients were provided full legal representation by volunteer pro bono attorneys.

Honoring our American Heroes

Every month, we hold a free legal advice clinic at the Casselberry Public Library to serve our American Heroes, our Veterans. They can obtain free advice concerning housing, family, probate or consumer problems. Veterans are able to obtain the legal assistance from dedicated volunteer attorneys and staff attorneys.

ADVOCATE OF THE YEAR

Karen Kay Estry

Alper since 2004, beginning as a paralegal and then becoming an associate in 2011, until she became a partner October 2014. At that time the firm's name was changed to "Law Offices of Alper & Estry." She is the proud mother of five children, two sons who both served in the military, and three daughters. The focus of Karen's practice still remains to help individuals, through difficult times. Karen actively participated in our pro bono program and generously donates her time to help our economically disadvantaged clients in a range of cases. ACCESS TO JUSTICE FOR CHILDREN AWARD

David Francis Barden



David F. Barden received his Juris Doctor from Barry University's Dwayne O. Andreas School of Law where he graduated Magna Cum Laude. Since becoming a member of the Florida Bar, he has been handling cases involving Aviation Law, Business Law, Real Estate Law, Contract Law, Probate Law and Wills, Trusts and Estates.

After receiving his Bachelor of Science in Business Administration with Honors from Northeastern University in Boston, Massachusetts, David became a U.S. Naval Aviator. While on active duty, he earned Aircraft Commander and Mission Commander designations in the P-3 Orion long-range patrol aircraft.

After leaving active duty David stayed active in the Naval Reserve and became a pilot for Delta Air Lines, flying both domestic and international routes. He now practices law in Central Florida. He is member of the Real Property, Probate and Trust Law section of the Florida Bar. David lives in Lake Mary with his wife and their two children. David generously donated countless hours and his legal expertise to help a young high school student probate his parents estate when both parents died suddenly. David even drove the child to the hospital to get the necessary documentation needed to administer the estate. He assured that the child gain title to the parent's home where he could continue to live in his childhood home. The child now has obtained employment and living in a stable environment.

WHY I DO PRO BONO WORK.

Access to Justice for Veterans Award

Honorable Judge John L. Woodard, III



Honorable Judge John L. Woodard, III was appointed to the Seminole County bench on May 2, 2007. Judge Woodard handles cases in Seminole County criminal courthouse. Judge Woodard helped establish one of the first veterans courts in Central Florida. Veterans court is an attempt to help diagnose the root causes of criminal offenders and treat them with resources that already are available but underused at the Department of Veterans Affairs. Willing offenders can enroll in diversion programs that involve everything from mental health and substance abuse treatment to community service and mentoring. Upon successful completion of Veterans court allows all charges to be dropped. Judge Woodard says he has seen veteran court not only transform lives, but save them. America has been slowly waking up to the ugly reality of life after combat.

Pro Bono Service Award

Community Partner Award


Meals on Wheels Etc.
